The *Judge's Daughter* contains the transcribed childhood diary of Mary Stearns Cushing of Charlestown, N.H. This remarkable diary, begun when the diarist was nine years old, records growing up in a small New England town during the Civil War. The book continues through Mary's marriage to Benjamin Gibson, their subsequent move to Weeping Water, Nebraska, and later years. The book contains short biographies of Mary and her immediate family, biographical and genealogical information about everyone mentioned in her diary, excerpts from her brother's naval diaries and autobiographical excerpts of Francis Green's Civil War naval service.

Unlike many diary transcriptions, which leave the reader wondering about the meanings of words now out of usage, and incidents long forgotten, the book is substantially footnoted to aid the reader in fully understanding Mary's time period. The 314-page book's attributes:
